

Director of Boarding Report

Recently I listened to the panel at the 125th Anniversary and enjoyed hearing the Old Girls talk about being a boarder and how it helped them learn about life. It reminded me - that while at times being a boarder is tough, you can never lose sight of what skills and attributes are developed, setting students up for their adult life. If you haven't listened to it, you can find the link on the SHCS Facebook page – it was enjoyable panel.

Boarding provides our students with so many learning moments, some are small and some are bigger. These experiences give our young woman the ability to grow their resilience toolkit and bounce back when they hit adversity. Every parent wants their children to be able to do this. When we see our children hurting, we hurt and we have to cognitively stop ourselves from running in and rescuing them. Our job is to empower our children to grow their own self-efficacy capabilities.


Currently we have some of our Year 9s working through homesickness. This is always hard and many are having to dig deep, breathe and put in place strategies that help them move forward and adjust. It is an intrinsic part of boarding and each boarder will experience the feeling of homesickness. Nearly all of our boarders share a bedroom or apartment space with others - this is a platform for teaching compassion, tolerance, patience, empathy and understanding. None of these attributes can be just given to our young people, they have to be experienced so they can grow their people skills and coping strategies.

Managing increased freedom with devices for our older boarders presents challenges and learning moments, particularly in terms of social media. This includes; how to use it, ignore it, control it, managing what we post and thinking about what we make social media mean to us. In Year 10 and 11 Prep this term we shared an article about a local social media bullying incident, where the perpetrator was prosecuted. Our conversations were around how we can better look after each other and for some, they may have had a moment where they stopped and considered what and how they post.

Friendships are another big learning moment for our boarders. They morph and change as we learn from each other, we begin to figure out what friendships align with our values and perhaps which ones don't. Being brave and holding fast to your values is hard work as a teenager, however it is how we decide who we want to be, who we can trust and who we want to be around. From tough times we learn that our actions impact others we care for and that we also have the opportunity to lean in with integrity and own our behaviour.

I have highlighted a few areas where our boarders experience learning, however there are many more everyday small hostel moments that provide rich learning for your daughter throughout her teenage years. The message from the Old Girls panel was that 'Boarding Builds Better People' and everyday your daughter is growing and becoming a better person:)

Greta is torn when presented with a mysterious around-the-world adventure, gifted to her by her late best friend. Does she leave her perfect life with perfect routine? Or does she throw away the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity because of the insecurities she faces? And what about her pet chicken, Marilyn Monroe?

At the start of the book, reading Greta's chaotic anxieties is rather stressful, and I found it quite hard to stay engaged. Her thought processes and the actions she took were quite predictable, as she was scared to leave her routine. She lived under her mother's mantra "no expectation, no disappointment." As the story progressed, I found it heartwarming to watch Greta's personality flourish and embrace her true self, not living under the shadow of her late mother.

I feel that many teenagers in our society could relate to this book. From the anxieties we have every day, and the second-guessing on every decision we make, it's exhausting. Watching Greta overcome these fears has shown me that it will never be too late to step out of my comfort zone and go on an adventure.
