

#### Tolcarne's Courage Culture

Over the past 2-3 years Tolcarne staff have embraced the opportunity to develop and work towards growing a COURAGE CULTURE amongst our team. Having a courageous staff culture means that as a team we work towards modeling brave attributes, behaviours and skills for students.

What does a COURAGE CULTURE look like?

An organisations culture will stem from its leadership. The leadership team at Tolcarne is leaning into our own VULNERABILITY, because it is so important to us that as an organisation we work towards embedding a COURAGE CULTURE. We are committed to having a hostel that is BRAVE and leads with grounded confidence and doesn't lead for self-protection.

Recently in December, we surveyed our Tolcarne staff to ask them to describe how they feel about the way in which Tolcarne is being lead and the culture we have. The responses will help us understand where on the continuum our staff think we are: Is Tolcarne being lead with grounded confidence or from a place of self-protection? Does Tolcarne have a courage based culture or a fear based culture? The results of this survey will help us understand what our staff think we are doing well and what areas we can work on.
